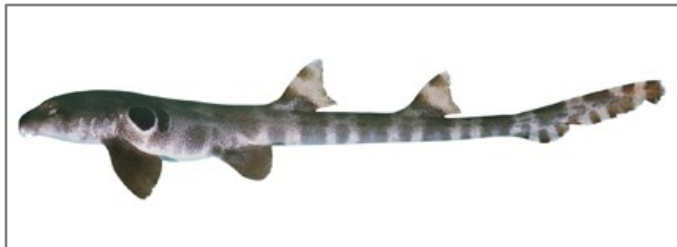


Speckled Carpetshark, *Hemiscyllium trispeculare*

Report Card Remarks	Small species with minimal fishing pressure in Australia		

Summary

The Speckled Carpetshark is a small species found across northern Australia and possibly in Indonesia. Its primary habitat is shallow, inshore waters and coral reefs. In Australia, marine parks protect much of its critical habitat where it is likely abundant. There are no important



fishing pressures in Australia, although a small aquarium trade may target the species. As it has a large range and there are currently no major threats in Australia, the Speckled Carpetshark is assessed as Least Concern (IUCN) and in Australia, Sustainable (SAFS).

Distribution

The Speckled Carpetshark is found on the northern coast of Australia from Rockhampton (Queensland) across the Northern Territory and to Ningaloo (northern Western Australia) (Last and Stevens 2009, Allen et al. 2013). Its occurrence in Indonesia requires confirmation (Last and Stevens 2009, Ebert et al. 2013).

Stock structure and status

There is currently no information on population size, structure, or trend for the species.

Fisheries

The Speckled Carpetshark is collected for the aquarium trade and bycatch from fishing activities. However, capture as bycatch is likely low as it uses coral reef habitats. These activities likely place minimal pressure on the species. Therefore, there are currently no major threats in Australia. Effects of exploitation in Indonesia are unknown.

Habitat and biology

The Speckled Carpetshark is found in shallow tropical waters along the coast and on coral reefs. Individuals are commonly observed under coral structures. Little else is known of the biology.
